FOREWORD

Inclusion is the main theme of the 10th edition of UNDP's parliamentary development newsletter with a special focus on youth, women and minorities. Ensuring inclusive and open parliaments is critical for promoting "citizen expectations for voice, the rule of law and accountability", as stated in Outcome 2 of UNDP's new Strategic Plan (2014-2017). Inclusive parliaments need to ensure that all sectors of society - particularly the poorest and marginalized groups, including women, youth and minorities are equally and fairly represented, and are given equal opportunities for participation. Although demand for inclusiveness is strongly voiced in the Arab region recently, it has also been reflected in post conflict recovery,

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democratic transitions and wider development processes in all regions throughout the past decade. Experiences from Kenya, Zimbabwe, Nepal, Ghana, Bolivia, Kyrgyzstan, Georgia, and many others demonstrate the crucial importance of inclusion and public participation in parliaments. To this end, UNDP is increasingly supporting the capacities of parliaments around the world to effectively engage all citizens without discrimination and to protect their rights, and capture their aspirations in the laws that are passed. The UNDP Strategic Plan 2014-17 reaffirms this commitment through its objective to support "parliaments, constitution making bodies and electoral institutions to perform core functions for improved accountability, participation and representation" (Output 2.1). Outcome 2 of UNDP's first Youth Strategy also specifically calls for greater "youth civic engagement and participation in politics and public institutions".

With regards to women, UNDP has been: training MPs on gender-budgeting (Sudan); supporting first-time women parliamentary candidates (Indonesia); promoting the adoption of gender-sensitive laws such as the Domestic Violence Bill (The Gambia), the law on the Protection of Women and Family Members from Domestic Violence (Lebanon), and the gender-parity electoral law (Tunisia); strengthening parliamentary oversight of the implementation of the gender equality law (Kosovo); developing a 30% gender provision to increase women's presence in Parliament (Liberia); enhancing the use of ICTs to empower women in politics (iKNOW Politics); strengthening women parliamentary groups (El Salvador), organizing a Practice / Mock Parliament for Women (Tonga and Solomon Islands); supporting the Woman and Child Committee in conducting gender legal reviews and addressing priority laws (Lebanon); assisting parliament in developing a Gender Strategy and Action Plan (Jordan); launching an Action Plan for women parliamentarians (Algeria); training women MPs and undertaking a gender review of the Rules of Procedure (Somalia); promoting the adoption of the Declaration on Arab Women's Political participation and establishment of network of Arab women parliamentarians in the Arab States region.

With regards to youth, UNDP has been: organizing national youth parliaments (Trinidad and Tobago); holding parliamentary consultations on the rights of girls and children (Ethiopia); assisting youth parliamentary committees in developing a National Youth Strategy (Sierra Leone); developing policy implementation strategies on women and youth participation in party structures and elections (Lebanon); organizing a youth training camp (Iraq); increasing awareness of youth in the areas of social contract, accountability, and democratic political processes, strengthening the leadership skills of women and youth for greater political leadership roles in party structures, including through the support to student councils of universities and the Youth Palestinian Legislative Council (OPT).

All these achievements are highlighted in the interactive map below. The map also shares success stories and international best practices of national legal frameworks and law reforms that strengthen women's empowerment, such as: the 2010 Women's Act and 2013 Domestic Violence Bill in The Gambia, the 2008 Gender Equality Act and 2010 Act on gender quota in Leeland, amendments of the 1958 family code in Morocco (2004) and the 1926 civil code in Turkey (2002), the 2013 electoral quota for women in

IPU's "Women in Parliament: a year in review"

2013 breaks all the records for women's participation in parliaments worldwide. The percentage of parliamentary seats occupied by women rose to 21.8 per cent, an increase of 1.5 percentage points – double the average rate of increase in recent years. The document reviews the progress made by women in Parliament in 2013.






NDI Gender Assessment of Tunisia's National Constituent Assembly

UNDP's Youth Strategy is the Organization's first wide strategy to inform on-going and future programming and policy development on youth. In response to the worldwide phenomenon of young men and women calling for meaningful civic, economic, social and political participation, including in recent consultations on the post-2015 development agenda, UNDP's

Youth Strategy identifies development challenges and issues facing youth today, and more importantly offers forward-looking recommendations for strategic entry points and engagement of a broad range of partners, including young people themselves, in addressing youth empowerment issues around the world. The UNDP Youth Strategy offers key entry points for systematic and coordinated action to support youth within an increasingly complex development context for their social, economic and political development. The Strategy was presented in Tunis, Tunisia followed by a knowledge sharing and prospective forum on civic engagement and participation in political processes and public institutions (31 March $-\ 2$ April).

Launch of the 'How-To Guide: Renewable Energy for Parliamentarians' by UNDP Administrator Helen Clark




In the framework of their joint 'Parliamentary Action on Renewable Energy' (PARE) project, UNDP and Climate Parliament have developed a 'How-To Guide: Renewable Energy for Parliamentarians'. The Guide explores the benefits of renewable energy development, presents an overview of renewable energy technologies and their respective applications, and offers concrete guidelines and tips for parliamentary action. The Guide is richly illustrated with case studies and best practices, and

pays specific attention to policy and regulatory frameworks. The launch of the Guide was organised at the occasion of the first <u>Forum of the Sustainable Energy for All initiative</u>, on June 4, and took place during the session on 'New business models: bringing sustainable energy to the energy

Parliaments and Gender Equality in Latin America and the Caribbean

Other highlights from the field

Bolivia - strengthening parliaments' role in promoting the rights of minorities and Indigenous Peoples (IPs)

Parliamentary delegations from over 20 countries (including Morocco, Kenya, Chile, Guyana, Haiti, Mexico, Argentina, Suriname, Burundi, Congo, Peru, Colombia, Portugal, Ecuador, Nepal, Angola, Bolivia, Guatemala, El Salvador, Panama, and Uganda) reaffirmed their commitment to protecting the rights of Indigenous Peoples during the International Parliamentary Conference held in Santa Cruz de la Sierra, Bolivia (7 to 9 April 2014). In addition to anchoring the principles of self-determination and selfgovernance of IPs, UNDP made specific recommendations regarding the upcoming World Conference on Indigenous Peoples (WCIP), the high-level plenary meeting of the General Assembly to be held on September 22-23, 2014 in New York City, calling for Indigenous Peoples to have a meaningful role in the proceedings of the Conference and in the formulation of its outcome document. UNDP's Global Human Rights Advisor, Shireen Said, made a statement, including recommendations and suggestions that later featured in the conference declaration. Inputs were also gathered for UNDP's draft thematic paper on 'Governance and Indigenous Peoples' including key messages that will be submitted to the WCIP, once finalized. Parliamentarians also agreed to submit a series of specific parliamentary actions for the consideration of the World Conference. UNDP conducted interviews with several MPs including Indigenous women MPs from Nepal, Peru, Ecuador, Kenya and the Secretary General of the Bolivian House of

Representatives (see links to videos on the right).

Following the conference, the Legislative Assembly of El Salvador ratified a constitutional reform on


June 12 that recognizes indigenous peoples and commits the state to adopt public policies to encourage the development of all indigenous communities in the country. **Read the full article** here">here.

Women's equal participation and representation in Parliament: 58th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)

The 58th session of the <u>Commission on the Status of</u> Women (CSW) took place at United Nations Headquarters in New York from 10 to 21 March 2014. Representatives of Member States, UN entities, and ECOSOC-accredited non-governmental organizations (NGOs) from all regions of the world attended the session. The main theme discussed concerned the challenges and achievements in the implementation of the Millennium Development Goals for women and girls. Many of the discussions also sought to address the low levels of women in political decision-making and the persistence of discriminatory attitudes, norms and frameworks which impede progress.

Post-2015 Toolkit for Parliamentarians



The Toolkit was developed by the CPA (UK branch), with support from UNDP. It draws inputs from the international conference on parliaments and the Post-2015 Development Agenda. The Conference was held at the Houses

of Parliament in London on 25- 29 November 2013. It provides information and advice to help parliamentarians to become actively involved in the post-2015 process, including ideas from parliamentary colleagues on how parliamentarians can influence the formulation of the post-2015 development goals and examples and case studies explaining how parliamentarians can monitor the implementation of the post-2015 development goals through their legislative, oversight, budget scrutiny and representational responsibilities. Sudan - Training MPs on gender-budgeting

Since 2011, Sudan enshrined a 25 per cent gender quota in its election code. 25 per cent of the women members are elected on the basis of proportional representation at the state level from separate and closed party lists. Voters vote for only one women's list of their choice. Only parties whose women's lists clear the 4% threshold qualify to access seats reserved for women (112 seats reserved for women in total). By 2012 Sudan had its highest proportion of women in parliament (30 per cent) and in government (28 per cent). Within the framework of the Accountability and Citizens' Participation Project (2011-2015), UNDP has been working closely with stakeholders who have a direct influence on, or a direct interest in how budgetary processes are run best. This has involved political parties, the media and civil society groups including women and minority groups. They have taken part in broad programmes of training and educational activities. These have focused on the budgetary process (how government funds are divided up) as well as an emphasis on the oversight of that process (checking that it is transparent and accountable). More widely, UNDP has been instrumental in improving the skills, knowledge and understanding of parliamentarians on public budget management. Included is that parliamentarians must consider how their budgetary decisions impact women, and vice versa. UNDP supports Sudan with several initiatives to foster transparent governance by strengthening institutional mechanisms. For example, women standing committees have been established within the state legislative councils.

Algeria – Declaration on Arab Women's Political participation adopted & network of Arab women parliamentarians established

An International 'Conference on Effective and Sustainable Participation of Women Elected Assemblies' was held in Algiers, in December 2013. The 'Algiers Declaration on Arab Women's Political Participation' adopted, enlists 14 points of action to increase and enhance women's political participation across the Arab region, including constitutional and legal reforms to ensure equality of access for women, enacting temporary special measures to ensure higher representation in elected bodies, and public education awareness to change prevailing stereotype prejudicial towards women's political participation. Participants also committed to establishing active network of current Arab women parliamentarians at national and regional levels to enhance the effectiveness and sustainability of women's political participation, and to develop strategies and action plans to achieve

UNDP Webinar video: Supporting inclusive constitutional and parliamentary processes in Tunisia



Tunisia has been undertaking a comprehensive democratic transition since the 2011 revolution, which launched the 'Arab Spring', culminating with the adoption of 'a constitution of consensus' voted by the National Constituent Assembly on January 26, 2014 with an impressive result of 200 votes in favor (out of 216 members). The adoption of the constitution is a major milestone and opens a new chapter in the transition in Tunisia. The next phase will be crucial in the consolidation of democracy. On May 15, 2014, Jonathan Murphy, UNDP's current Chief Technical Advisor to the Tunisian Constituent Assembly, participated in a webinar to present and discuss the key results and lessons learnt from

this goal. An Action Plan for women parliamentarians was also launched in Algeria with support from UNDP following the Conference.

Bangladesh & Trinidad and Tobago - Youth Parliaments

UNDP brought 154 child parliamentarians from all districts and backgrounds, including marginalized groups, to the **Bangladesh Parliament** for a weeklong mock parliament session (May 7, 2014). Child parliamentarians set out to highlight children's issues in Bangladesh, and produced two draft bills: "Bangladesh Child Rights Commission Act 2014" and; "Prohibition of Physical and Mental Torture on the Students at the Institutional Level Bill 2014." **Read the full story** here.

El Salvador - Strengthening the Parliamentary Group of Women

UNDP El Salvador has been providing technical advice to the Parliamentary Group of Women in four areas:

- ✓ Design of legal reforms to improve gender equality: law against family violence, penal code, procedures, family code, social security laws. A reform proposed by the Commission of women and gender equality (established in May 2012) on the law against violence was approved in 2013.
- ✓ Creation of an inter-institutional technical group to review the legal reforms. The group was integrated by the General Prosecution of the Republic, General Attorney, ISDEMU (Salvadoran Institute for Women's Development) and Supreme Court of Justice.
- ✓ Design of the first Gender Policy and Institutional Plan at the Parliament.
- ✓ Establishment of political participation quota of 30% of women as candidates (national and regional parliament and municipal councils). The law will be applied for the first time in 2015.

Sierra Leone - Parliamentary Committee on Youth Affairs tackles the National Youth Strategy

The draft National Youth Strategy supported by UNDP was presented to the Parliamentary Committee on Youth Affairs on 20th March 2014 for their inputs. The National Youth Strategy 2014-2018 was then finalized and launched by the President on the 15th of April 2014. The Youth Affairs Committee will actively conduct oversight of the implementation of the National Youth Strategy once the implementation is begun by the Ministry. **Read the full story** here.

Indonesia - UNDP supports first-time women parliamentary candidates

490 female politicians have benefited from training under UNDP's 'Strengthening Women's Participation and Representation in Governance in Indonesia's (SWARGA) project, ahead of the April 9, 2014 parliamentary elections. UNDP's support resulted in an increase in the number of female candidates in the parliamentary elections. Of 6,607 legislative candidates racing for the House of Representatives (DPR) seats in the elections, some 37 percent or 2,467 were women, up from 30 percent in the legislative elections in 2009. Of the 560 candidates elected to the DPR, 94 were



women, or around 17 percent. Previously, from the 2004 general elections, the representation of women in the Indonesian parliament was just almost 11 percent.

Kosovo - committee oversight of the implementation of the gender equality law

The Committee on Human Rights, Gender Equality, and Missing Persons was supported in drafting the new designs, methods and techniques for monitoring of the law implementation in Kosovo. Socially sensitive laws such as the Law on Gender Equality, was monitored with a new strategy which implied usage of online self-administered questionnaires for respondents and randomly sampled institutions to be visited by MP's. This approach has shown to be more time and cost effective and has enabled the Committee to reach in-depth information and data from a broader number of institutions.
